Maa Tara Chandi Temple: A Sacred Abode of Maa Shakti

The Shakti Peetha, or seat of Shakti, is a place of worship where consecrated ashes of the goddess Shakti or Sati are sprinkled. These ashes are believed to be scattered throughout the Indian subcontinent. In the case of Maa Tara Chandi Temple, the presence of the goddess is felt strongly, attracting devotees from far and wide.

Just 5 kilometers south of <u>Sasaram</u>, there is another temple dedicated to Goddess Tarachandi. Close to this temple, there is an inscription of Pratapdhavala on a rock, adding to the historical significance of the area. Devotees from all over gather in large numbers to pay their respects and seek the blessings of the goddess.

If you visit Sasaram, don't miss the opportunity to explore the nearby <u>tourist attraction</u>, Dhuwan Kund. Located about 5.1 kilometers southwest of the town, this enchanting spot offers a tranquil escape amidst <u>nature</u>.
